# RELIGIOUS FESTIVALS

## Religious Festivals

- India, is a land of diversity and is the birthplace for 4 major religions of the world.
- Hinduism, Sikhism, Buddhism and Jainism.
- Apart from this we celebrate festivals of all religion.

#### HINDU FESTIVALS

Hinduism is the largest religion in India by population. The festivals of this religion differ from region to region and from state to state. The two most widely celebrated Hindu festivals are - Holi and Diwali.



# REGIONAL FESTIVALS

#### **DURGA PUJA**

#### WEST BENGAL

- The puja was earlier only held in the houses of Zamindars, but now this puja is held in both communities and also in the houses of Zamindars.
- The modern form of Durga Puja, that we see today was started by Maharaja Krishno Chandro Nandy, who was a major player in Battle of Plassey.
- The community Durga Pujo is called Baroari Durga Pujo, since earlier the concept was that twelve friends would together celebrate the festival and welcome the Goodes.
- Theme based Durga Pujo is very popular in Kolkata now.



# Ganesh Chturthi

#### MAHARASTRA

- The festival with such great fervour that we see today was started by Bal Gangadhar Tilak.
- He once visited Kolkata during Kali Puja, and saw the celebrations there. Seeing it Bal Gangadhar Tilak wanted something like that in his own state, so he started the Ganpati Mahotsav in Maharashtra
- Again theme based pandals and pujas are very popular.







# MYSURU DASARA

KARNATAKA

The traditional procession of the festival includes the Jamboo Savari, a parade of beautifully adorned elements that carry the idol of Goddess Chamundeshwari. These elephants are accompanied by dance, music and folklore. This torch-light parade, known as Panjina Kavayithu, starts from Mysore Palace and ends at Bannimantap. Other festivities include the exhibition opposite to the

Mysore Palace, concerts and the Kusti Spardhe or the wrestling-bout.





#### ISLAMIC FESTIVALS

India is the country with the largest Muslim population outside Muslimmajority countries with about 200 million people. Hence all the festivals are celebrated with great fervour.



#### EID UL FITR


- Eid ul fitr means the joy at the end of the days of fasting. This is the day following the appearance of the new moon.
- This festival is particularly famous amongst children, as they are given a special prize money called eidee.
- This Eid is also called meethi Eid, as seewiyan is prepared
- A special called Hallem is also prepared in Hyderabad. It also has GI Tag for it






### EID UL ZUHA

- It is one of the grandest islamic festivals.
- · It is also called as Bakri Eid
- Charities are organised on this day.





#### **BUDDHA JAYANTI**

- Buddha's birthday is a Buddhist festival that is celebrated in most of East Asia commemorating the birth of the Prince Siddhartha Gautama, later the Gautama Buddha, and was founder of the Buddhism.
- According to Buddhist tradition and modern academic consensus, Gautama Buddha was born c. 563–480 BCE in Lumbini (currently located in Nepal), and raised in the Shakya capital of Kapilavastu.








#### MAHAMASTAKABHISHEKA

Mahamastakabhisheka is a festival held once every twelve years in the town of Shravanabelagola, Karnataka. It is held in veneration of an immense 18 meter high statue of Bahubali. The last anointing took place in February 2018, and the next ceremony will occur in 2030

MAKAR SANKRANTI IS CELEBRATED IN DIFFERENT PARTS OF INDIA, IN DIFFERENT WAYS.



- Each year there's a chief guest, who is a head of state of different countries of the world. Last year the chief guest was Brazil's President Jair Bolsanaro.




# INDEPENDENCE DAY
